## T he 2004

Darda honors J. Douglas Lepter, professor of communication and chairperson of the Division of Communication, Language, and Literature.
Known for his compassion,
 sense of humor, and ability to make learning enjoyable and applicable, Dr. Lepter has been an important part of the Trevecca community since 1991.

Originally from New Jersey, Professor Lepter finished his undergraduate studies at Eastern Nazarene College in 1972. While studying electrical engineering, he sensed a call to preach and teach that caused him to change his plans. He earned a master's degree in religion from ENC in 1973 and was ordained in the Church of the Nazarene in 1975. He served more than twenty years in pastoral ministry, two as a full-time evangelist. After earning a master's of theology from Asbury Theological Seminary in 1990, he completed a Ph.D. in communication from the University of Kentucky in 1996. Communication, he believed, was compatible with his dual call to preaching and teaching.

On a personal note, Dr. Lepter and his wife, Samuella, have been married for thirty-two years and have one son, John Wesley; a daughter-in-law, Pam Roden-Lepter; and three grandsons-John Wesley, Jr., Austin William, and Patrick Ryan. His hobbies include stamp and baseball card collecting, cheering for the St Louis Cardinals, and being an ardent "Trekkie."

Dr. Lepter has made his mark at Trevecca, receiving the Conference of Chairpersons' Teaching Excellence Award in 1995, and the Excellence in Teaching Award for MHR, 1997-1998, and he is a past recipient of the Faculty Member of the Year Award. He has filled many roles and touched many lives. He continues to express the love of God to others as husband, father, grandfather, professor, pastor, colleague, and friend.

## Starting Line

 tarting Line is a mentoring program that serves prisoners' children between the ges of eight and eighteen. All mentors are volunteer students who go through a ong application process that includes interviews and training programs.tarting Line's mission is to assist the University in its ministry to prisoners, exrisoners, victims, and their families and to promote Biblical standards in the riminal justice system. Student mentors are paired together and then assigned their wn children. The mentors develop one-on-one relationships with each child by way f weekly in-person visits, phone calls, e-mails, or postcards. Student mentors make consistent commitment for at least a year. Each mentor has the responsibility of eeping in touch with the child and deciding which day of the week to spend pgether. This season's team had its best year ever and represented Trevecca well in the NAIA.
