Freshmen Capture "Class of the Year" Trophy; Music Club Wins-Top Honor **JABLECKI TO FACULTY APPROVE**

Lawrence T. Jablecki, Assistant Professor of Philosophy, at Trevecca Nazarene College has announced tentative plans of study next year in one of two European Universities, Jablecki has received formal acceptance from the University of Glasgow; Glasgow, Scotland, and is waiting for final approval from Manchester University, Manchester, England.

Mr. Jablecki has made no decision on which school he will attend, but will be going to one of the two schools mentioned. Present plans call for a departure date in early September for preparation of school, beginning in October. Jablecki will be accompanied by his wife and pet

If the decision is made to pursue learning at the University of Glasgow, founded 1451, Jablecki will be working on a Bachelors of Letters degree (B. Litt). The degree is an approximate two year program and is actually between a Masters degree and a Doctorate degree. He will be under the supervision of senior member of the University D.D. Raphael, a widely known philosopher. The main objection of the course will be a thesis which is to be prepared by

Should the decision fall on Manchester University. Jablecki will be working for a Ph. D. after a year of trial working. Also, if this is the chosen school, he will be doing limited instructing at the British Isles

Nazarene College.

The reason for going abroad, according to Jablecki, is to get a more specific education, particularly pertaining philosophy. At present he would like to study under the department of Political and Social philosophy and also further his knowledge on the Natural Law Theory, which deals with human rights. The reason for studying these subjects is because they deal with pertinent issues in the contemporary world.

Mr. Jablecki plans to come back to the United States within three years and pursue teaching at a university. He feels that because of his somewhat more specific foreign education he will be able to obtain the needs for more specific instruction to his

field of study.

REVISED **ATTENDANCE POLICY**

At the May 20 Trevecca Faculty meeting a new revised attendance policy was approved. After reconsidering the policy that was to be enforced this fall, the Academic Council decided to reconstruct again the attendance policy and make several seemingly radical changes. The other policy was printed in an earlier issue of TREV-ECHOES and caused some controversy and misunderstanding by students because of several unclear statements written in the policy.

"Basically," said Dr. S. Parry, Academic Dean-elect; "the revised policy involved putting greater responsibility for attendance on the students, while still following the premise that regularity in class attendance is essential for the realization of our educational goals."

The Academic Council has moved to delete two phrases from the new policy: a phrase worded "There are no excused absenses," and another phrase which appeared to indicate that make-up work was a penalty. According to Dean-elect Parry, sickness may be excused by a doctors written permit, or excused according to the individual teachers policy. Also make-up work must not be mistaken for make-up busy work. Parry said, that since the policy allows for some variation it would be necessary for all teachers to make known their own attendance policy at the beginning of each quarter.

To be added to the new policy are two statements for attendance in classes.

1. For lower division classes (100-200 courses) regardless of classification, the teacher will keep a strict attendance record and follow guidelines set forth in the earlier policy revision.

Responsibility for attendance in all upper division classes (300-400 courses) will be on the student regardless of classification.

Policy in classes with necessary attendance would be handled by the teacher of the class. This would apply to such classes as; Physical education, Speech, and others.

The Academic Council has recommended that this policy be adopted for use in the fall of 1968 on an experimental basis. At the conclusion of this time the council will review the program to determine if the policy is accomplishing its goal. Dr. Parry said that the policy, depending on student responsibility, could be stiffened, left as it is, or liberalized.



The carillon bells, donated by the Freshman class, ring out our praises to God for His help in one of Trevecca's most progressive years. We are awaiting the result of an Evaluation Committee which visited our campus in April in response to a final application for membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Our physical education center is under construction. The groundbreaking ceremony for the new science building will be on Alumni Day, May 27. We have had the largest enrollment in our history with the first graduating class of more than one hundred, including the first B. S. degree graduates, and the first graduates in business administration. A sizeable group of strong new faculty members have contributed much to the accomplishments of the year.

Prospects for the year 1968-69 are even brighter as we advance along all lines. All key faculty members will be with us again next year with additions in business education, business law, political science, mathematics, music and speech. The Academic Council envisions offcampus workshops for public school teachers and a project to upgrade disadvantaged young people of all races in our community in preparation for college and citizenship. On May 15 the Council also voted a completely new attendance policy which gives greater freedom to students in upper division classes. The progressive program of including voting student representatives on faculty and administrative councils and committees will be continued. Our physical education center will be ready for you in the fall with a varied program, including the possibility of intercollegiate athletics. A full schedule of cultural and religious activities will round out a challenging and fulfilling pro-





Fall Registration to Begin September 19

The fall registration period of Trevecca Nazarene College has been set later this year to allow for the new academic scheduling that is to take place. Upperclassmen are not required to report for registration until September 19 and 20, 1968. During this period sophomores, juniors, and seniors will register in that order.

Freshman Orientation week is to begin later also with the activities getting under way September 14 and continuing through Wednesday, September 18. During this time the new class will elect officers, have counseling service, and complete registration procedures.


All classes will get under way on Monday, September 23. The first quarter of the new '68-'69 year will not end until exams are taken just before Christmas holidays.

During the beginning portion of the summer all students, attending Trevecca this year, will receive trial registration packets and readmission blanks. All material is to be filled out and returned to the Academic Dean, immediately.

Just A Thought

Words again! How eternally facinating they are. With them we may reveal ourselves and our ideas, or conceal ourselves and cast a euphemistic aura over an idea that would otherwise look too exposed. Newsweek (5-2-68) tells about a college (not Trevecca) applying for a Federal grant for a new project, thus, "it is not simply a cross-disciplinary venture or an interdisciplinary venture, it is a pan-disciplinary venture and this, of course, is in the nature of all real experience." (Wow!) "Subvention", we are told takes the pain out of a request for "subsidy", and "strategic withdrawal" clothes "rout" with dignity. All this may be the "Newspeak" that George Orwell forsaw in his "1984. Flowery language is fine until it becomes so flowery that it begins to baffle the mind and ends up being cliches.

But we, too, may be engaging in the same traffic. Whenever we use a word or phrase or saying which "covers" an unexplored idea we speak "Newspeak". These verbal expressions which become a sort of sub-orthoxy and therefore pass our attention uncontested and undefined may be theological interlopers to be tracked down and made to give an account of themselves. In Germany's Nazi days Hitler conditioned the people to go off on an emotional jag whenever he said certain words. Mao is doing that in China today. Is it possible that we......oh no!


Whenevermen, even Christians, are mentally and emotionally insecure and baffled by the utter unfamiliarity and anguish of situations in the world about them the temptation presses in with terrible urgency to pull the few old and tried scraps of life tightly about them and retreat, and then to solve all the unsolvable, by pious cliches as they sit waiting for the "trump" from the sky announcing the destruction of all enemies. Then one of the otherwise truthful sayings can become a soul-numbing cliche; (e.g.) "Christ is the answer t every need. If so, forget this awful

May I say, loud and clear? CHRIST IS THE ANSWER TO ALL HUMAN NEED. But I mean this, not as a giant generalization, blind and unexamined, to cheaply obscure a world full of troubles that give knowledgeible men and our world leaders headaches and heartfailure. I do not mean it as a substitute for the dynamic call to service which rests on a Christian and from which the easy escape of the Rapture is not granted.

If we keep Jesus' methodology in our clinche, it becomes a powerful goad against our retreat mentality. It can keep us alive and profoundly irritated, not by our own discomforts, but by the conditions that prevent people from "hearing" the Gospel, such as injustice, bigotry, greed, unreleaved poverty, filth, social rejection, hatred, the indifference of Christians. And may I say? the practical application of Jesus' method will preserve in us the glowing "romance" which characterized our early Christian experience, a glow that often fades and is replaced by the pitiful confession of that lack in the noisy, clanging, unsympathetic "gong" of our sub-orthodoxy.

May we spend a moment following Jesus around to see how he became "the answer"? Hurry up, it is hard to keep up with Him. He keeps slipping away from the nice disciples to go down to eat and enjoy Himself among the disreputable people, harlots, criminals, "poluting" himself with the outcast races and unclean folk. He did not bring his own lunch, or insult them by a handout. He contributed nothing but Himself. No evangelism - yet, no sermons, just genuine love. He gave them a sense of personal worth by that love. He erased all second class citizenry. Becoming a man did not humiliate or tarnish Him. It lifted all men to His level. The religious people threw coins to the outcast and passed on. Some Christians said, "Be clothed and fed." Jesus left Himself with them and "they heard Him gladly," and He left a field open to evangelism.

Yes, Jesus is the answer -- but only as He demonstrated the involvement of the answer. Yes, He was after the "soul", but He could not find the soul disembodied from the whole self. Maybe our clinche has so much Truth in it that it may condemn us who mouth it too easily. "The servant is not above his Lord" (Matt. 10:24-39). In other words, words may be verbs as well as nouns. It's just a

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
