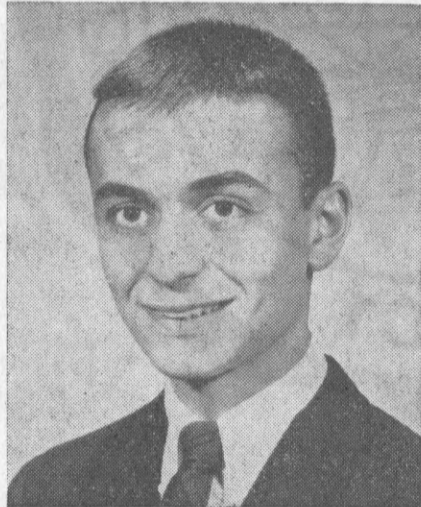
Keith Vennum

Billie Jean Cline

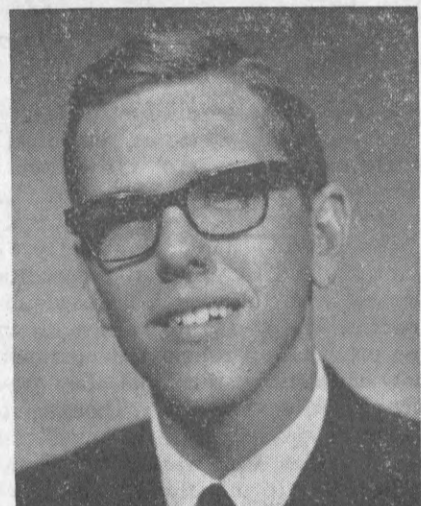
The daughter of Rev. and Mrs. M. D. Cline, Billie Jean Cline hails from Cayce, South Carolina. She has chosen elementary education as her major.

Billie Jean was selected as the female Junior Marshall for the 1966 graduation exercises for maintaining a 2.97 grade average.



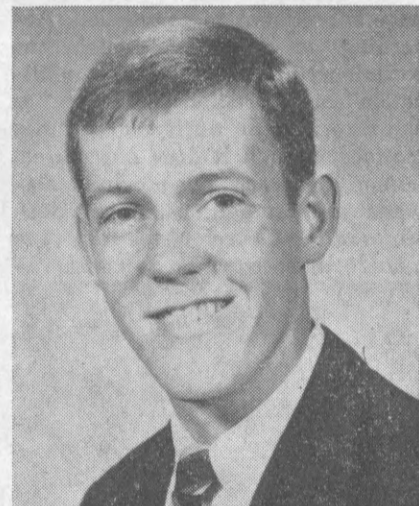
Jim Hendershot

Each year since 1963, Associates Capitol has awarded this scholarship to an outstanding Trevecca student.

Recipient of the scholarship for 1966-67 is Larry Knight, a senior from Niles, Michigan. Larry, a Business-Education major, has been very active in student activities during his four years at Trevecca. During his sophomore year he was president of the Trevecca Athletic Association and a member of the Student Council. Last year he was president of the Trevecca Phi Beta Lambda, a

national business fraternity.

While presenting the check to Anderson, Orman related that "my company has been watching the progress of Trevecca for several years. We consider your graduates very competent young men. We are happy to contribute to the growth of this fine business program that you have begun and we assure you of our continued support."

Upon receiving the scholarship, Larry Knight expressed his desire to "measure up to the confidence invested in me by Trevecca and by Associates Capitol."

Bring her sons and daughters home.

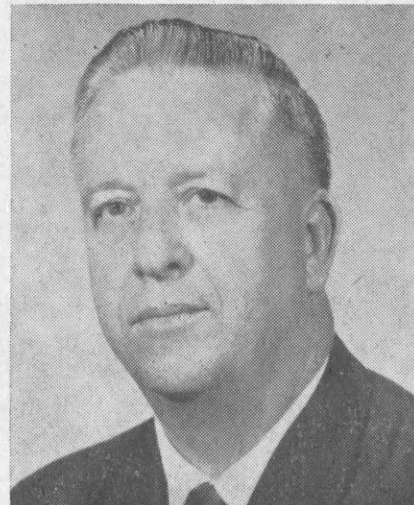


The motto symbolizes the wisdom of Christian education for the whole man—*Esse Quam Videri*, "To Be Rather Than To Seem." This states the purpose of the college to produce men and women of real quality, both Christian and educated. It symbolizes the fact that the Trevecca alumnus should have genuine Christian character, and should have attained academic excellence.

Dr. Moore Writes Historical Report

Dr. Ernest Moore, a professor of education at Trevecca, was recently selected by the Texas State Historical Association to write an article on the Church of the Nazarene for a supplementary volume to the *Handbook of Texas*. Dr. Moore was chosen because of his interest and information on the subject.

The following is an excerpt from this report. "Doctrinally, the Church of the Nazarene is of Methodist lineage, subscribing to the view expounded by John Wesley: that the moral depravity of the soul can be cleansed away by operation of the spirit of God in a religious experience subsequent to conversion. According to Nazarene belief, the experience, termed "entire sanctification" or "Christian perfection," is characterized by purifying of inner motives, though it does not perfect human judgement nor preclude mistakes and temptations. Other doctrines of the Church of the Nazarene include those common to conserva-



tive Protestantism. Belief in the free agency of man and in universal atonement places this denomination among Protestant churches espousing Arminianism.

Receiving his Ph.D. from the University of Texas, Dr. Moore was assisted by his wife, Mrs. Muriel P. Moore in the writing of the article. Mrs. Moore received her M.Mus., from the University of Texas.

Wall Announces New Award

The Alumni Council has announced that it will present the first annual "Alumni Award" next spring to the student who has contributed the most to college life and to a wholesome school spirit. The selection of the recipient will be made in cooperation with the Student Council. A certificate and a key, medal, trophy or plaque, will be given. Final details have not been worked out.

Alumni President Howard Wall said, "We would like for the recipient to be our guest at the Alumni Banquet. It is just this same collegiate spirit that he would represent as a student that we desire among our alumni."

The award will not be limited to any one class. It is conceivable that a person could win the award as a freshman and also win it each of the following years until he graduates.

The Alumni Award is not a duplication of the awards currently being presented by the Student Council. The purpose of the award is very similar to the "Citizenship" award; however, it differs in that the Student Council awards two certificates, one each to a man and lady citizen. The Alumni Award will recognize only one person.

Student comment on the film was favorable, "It was great," or "It just did something for me." Yet, there is no real way to describe a person's reaction to observing the episodes in Peter Marshall's life. As the viewer watches how Peter Marshall walked with God throughout his life, he receives many spiritual messages in addition to suspense, romance, and all the other qualities which make a good story.

The Lyceum Committee's time and efforts were well worthwhile. As Trevecca students left McClurkan building Friday night, they felt that they had not only been entertained but spiritually enriched as well.

BYRON BECOMES SPIRITUAL LEADER

Dr. Lloyd Byron, college chaplain at Trevecca, has already become an unexpendable part of campus life in his few months with us. A man of many talents, he has added a new dimension to chapel services and has proved himself a trusted spiritual counselor. Long acquainted with the workings of our church colleges, Dr. Byron has been a trustee of Eastern, Olivet, Pasadena, Trevecca and Nazarene Theological Seminary.

A native of Maine, Dr. Byron graduated from Eastern Nazarene College as valedictorian of his class. He also served as editor of ENC's first student newspaper, the *Advance*. At Boston University School of Theology Dr. Byron did graduate work. He received the D.D. from Pasadena Nazarene College.

Dr. Byron's first pastorate, before entering college, was in Jeffersonville, Indiana, as a circuit-rider. His salary ranged from \$27 to \$2.00 per week. His visitation was done on horseback, but on Sundays he traveled in his buggy.

Since those early days, Dr. Byron has pastored in Maine; Lowell, Massachusetts; Lansing, Michigan; New

Haven, Connecticut; Pasadena, California; and Kankakee, Illinois. Immediately before coming to Trevecca, he served as superintendent of the North Carolina district for fourteen years.

For eleven years Dr. Byron conducted radio broadcasts, and while serving in Michigan and California he became noted for his informal radio talks, one of which inspired Floyd Hawkins to write the well-known song, "God Knows and That's Enough for Me." Several of the Chaplain's devotional talks have been collected and published in his book, *The Winged Gospel*.

Dr. Byron met his wife Helen, originally from New Hampshire, in Lynn, Massachusetts. In the church there he was converted, ordained, and married.

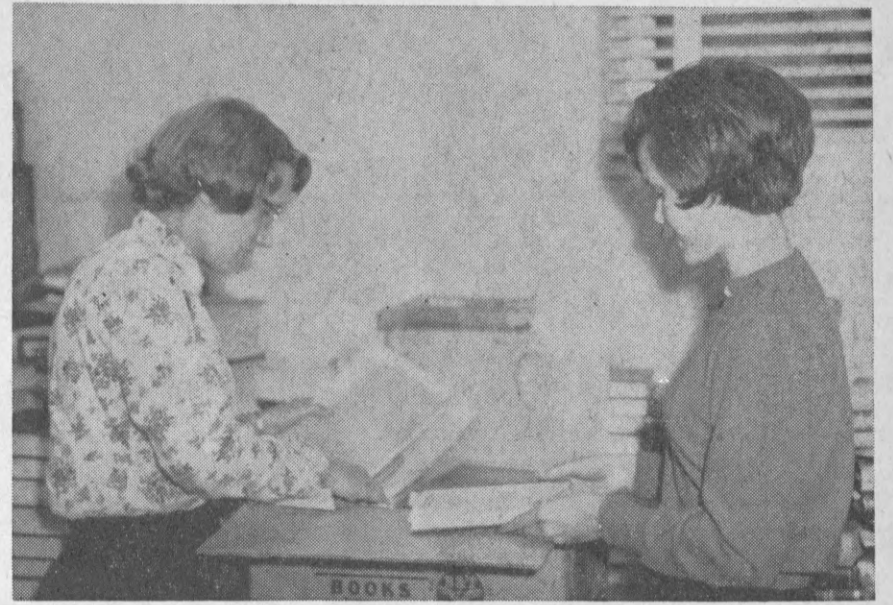
Dr. Byron is "thrilled with the tempo and the high-level of our students at Trevecca. The total morale of our student-faculty relationships is good." As an elected member of the fall Student Leadership Conference, Dr. Byron was "impressed with the thoughtful approach of the students" to the problems of college life.

Ozzie Smith, taking advantage of this opportunity, made a 20 yard run around the left end, but lost the ball on the next play to Walter Motley on a pass interception in favor of the Betas.
