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## SPICE of LIFE

Some time ago a speaker referred to a man who had no time for the little things which go to make life more meaningful and enjoyable unless there was some financial gain connected with them, and the speaker called this man a practical man. But a close examination of the business of living will reveal that one who takes such an attitude as that is really very impractical.

According to authorities, practical is opposed to ideal. A practical thing is workable and not merely theoretical. The man referred to above had an ideal and that ideal was material wealth. His theory was that if he could only make lots of money he could insure the success of himself and his family. He apparently did not realize that there were essential things which money could not buy and that one day he and his children were going to need some of those things on which to stand.

When the storm is on and others are being swept away before our eyes and things around us are failing us one by one, materialism does not

afford sufficient foundation. A clean heart, a useful life, a strong character, moral soundness, and proper attitudes are the practical things when we are forced to stand in the teeth of the storm with no shelter around us. They are not ideal and theoretical things which disappear before the storm, but they are solid, workable things which enable us to weather the storm and come out stronger.

There are those students whose ideal of preparation for their life's work is to prepare at the expense of others. Their theory is to get good grades by cheating their way through so that their good record will carry them on through life. But there always comes a time, when we are thrown on our own in the face of the realities of life, that we must depend on our resources and not on our records.

Beating one's way through any period of life has two devastating effects upon one: It weakens one's character; it reduces one's mental ability to the point of dependence on others. God wants us to be practical and build on sound things which will give us daily victory in life.

### THIS COLLEGIATE WORLD

At the University of Wisconsin when a professor runs home in tears to his wife, it doesn't mean he has been fired. He has probably been "flun'ed" by his students.

This reversal of academic procedure was thought up by the student board's academic relations committee, and give the long-hoped-for opportunity of the students to "tell off" their professors.
