

WHO'S WHO



H. H. Wise, teacher of Bible and practical theology, was born in the 19th century in Johnson County in Southern Illinois, four miles from New Burnside, Illinois, and three miles from Stone Fort. He attended the public schools at New Burnside; then, the county schools at Marshall and Walnut Grove. He completed the seventh and eighth grades, but being unable to attend high school, was required to take these grades over by his father, who was then his teacher.

On March 9, 1907, Brother Wise was converted in a revival in the Methodist Church at Stone Fort, Illinois, and in reality, began to preach the night he was converted. His first pastorate was the Baptist Church at Marion, Illinois. At the same time he was pastor of the Walnut Grove Baptist Church.

Brother Wise came to Trevecca Nazarene College, which was then located on 4th Avenue, on November 9, 1909. Working on Friday afternoons and Saturdays to pay his way the coming week, he worked his way through Trevecca for five years. With Rev. J. O. McClurkan as his teacher while in college, Brother Wise started a Bible Class in West Nashville, which resulted in a mission and later became the West Nashville Church of the Nazarene.

After a pastorate of nine years, having built a congregation of 175 members and a Sunday school average attendance of 150, he went to Trevecca College as business manager

and teacher in 1920-21. In the fall of '21, he was elected district superintendent of the Tennessee District Church of the Nazarene. In May of 1922, he accepted the pastorate of First Church, where he is now serving his twenty-fifth year. The work at the church speaks for itself. During these years, he has taught at Trevecca every year and has been a member of the school board.
