Men's Dormitory Under Construction

The hole in the ground and the pile of rocks beside Hardy Hall will soon be replaced by a modern, three story, fire-proof dormitory. It will be constructed with brick, concrete, concrete block, stone, and steel.

Mr. Charley Carpenter, a Nazarene layman, who has been a builder and contractor in Nashville for many years, is now working on the footing for the new building. He will oversee all the work as he did on the Administration Building.

The new building, situated and constructed in such a way as to be the first unit of a V-shaped dormitory, will cost approximately \$55,000. It will accommodate a capacity of eighty to one hundred students. Each room will be equipped with a clothes closet, and will share a bath with the adjoining room. At present the plans are to heat the dormitory with a hot air furnace.


PRESIDENT AND WIFE ATTEND FLORIDA DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

Dr. and Mrs. Gresham to Attend the Southern Historical Association

Dr. and Mrs. Gresham plan to attend the annual meeting of the Southern Historical Association, which will be held in Birmingham, Alabama, October 31-November 2.

This organization is composed mainly of scholars interested in Southern History, although it is attended by teachers from all over the United States.

Nashville, where the association met last year, will be well represented by several of Dr. Gresham's former Vanderbilt classmates.

One of the authors of our present College American History textbook will be a special speaker.

Dr. E. C. Dale of the University of Oklahoma, a former professor of both Dr. Gresham and Dr. Bracken, will speak on, "The Cherokee Indians in the Confederacy."

Other interesting topics are: "Social Life and Labor in the Old South," "Agriculture in the Old South," and "The Free Negro in the South."

It is interesting to note that the president of the association this year will be a woman, Miss Ella Lonn, of Goucher College. Her presidential address will be, "Reconciliation Between the North and South."
