



COLLEGE HILL CHURCH CHANGES PASTORS



Due to the heavy load of the building program Dr. A. K. Bracken, Dean of Religion, felt that his physical strength was not adequate for both the teaching duties and pastoral duties. He resigned in June in favor of a younger man.

The Church unanimously called Rev. Claude Galloway, former pastor of Fatherland Street Church, as its pastor. Rev. Galloway assumed his duties as pastor on July 15, 1951. The Galloways are now located on Nance Lane in the parsonage that was recently purchased by the Church.

The building program of the Church is still in effect. The contract for the steel work was let August 23, 1951 and the steel has been erected. On September 15th contracts were let for masonry work on the walls.

Until such time as the Church is completed, regular services are held in the College Chapel. All students are cordially invited to attend these services.

DR. MACKEY

Leafing through the pages of American history we learn about a tall Kentuckian whose youth was spent as a backwoodsman with hours of labor by day and diligent study by firelight, but who arose to become one of our nation's most beloved leaders—Abraham Lincoln. Turning then to the files of Trevecca College a similar picture can be seen of another tall Kentuckian who has steadily climbed the ladder of success for himself as well as for the promotion of Christian education. Yes, Dr. A. B. Mackey, president of our college, is truly endeared to the hearts of those who know the struggles and advancements of Trevecca Nazarene College.

Dr. Mackey was reared near Albany, Kentucky, in a home of seven children.

Interest in Holiness schools for Dr. Mackey dates back to childhood because a Holiness School near Highway, Kentucky, founded by John S. Keen is where he obtained his elementary training. The Church of the Nazarene at Highway is also Dr. Mackey's home church. His high school education was received at the Albany, Kentucky High School where he later taught. His college education was begun at Olivet where he finished two years as Olivet was then only a Junior College. Then he went to Eastern Ky. State Teacher's college where he was among the first to be graduated from that

institution. He received his Master of Arts degree from Peabody and then did his residence work on a Ph. D. at Harvard, University of Chicago, and Vanderbilt.

It was while Dr. Mackey was doing graduate work at Peabody that he became first affiliated with Trevecca. Dr. Mackey explains that he has served in every capacity from janitor to president and this includes even teaching home economics. For twenty-six years he has stood staunchly behind Trevecca and since 1937 has served as president.

His achievements are all memorable. The school now owns 70 acres of property with eight major buildings on it and has an expansion program already underway. Still further, the school is now free of all debt. Dr. Mackey has certainly given unstintingly of his time, influence, knowledge—in fact has given himself for Trevecca. His logical thinking, his devotion to righteousness, and his versatility have been traits that have insured his success. Those who know him and each student of Trevecca are soon aware of his kindly, humble spirit, his enthusiasm, and his brilliant mind. His chapel talks have been an encouragement to scores as he urges everyone to do his best in whatever he does—whether minister, statesman, or just a laborer.

Another school year is beginning. Dr. Mackey and others have worked to establish our school.

Trevecca stands for high scholarship and above all—spiritual fervor. These attributes can be achieved only by the efforts of us as students. Let us begin the year by resolving to do our best—for the enrichment of our lives and the furtherance of a Christ-centered education!
