The outline of the Winter quarter chapel services, planned for the benefit of the faculty and student body of Trevecca College, was made known, during the first chapel hour of the new year, by the college dean, Dr. L. P. Gresham.

January 7-11 was ladies' week. Ladies of the faculty capably discussed some phases of a student's life with such topics as: "Why Study and Learn," "Tools for Learning," "Etiquette," "Romance of Scholarship," and "Recreation and Extra-Curricular Activities."

January 14-18 will be the period of special spiritual emphasis for the quarter. Revival services will be conducted during chapel hour with Brother Sammy Martin for the evangelist.

January 21-25. A series of topics to stress the practical application of theology. "The Master Dreamer," "Thyself Approved," "Shepherds Crowned," "Heralds of Passion," and "Our Foreign Ambassadors" will be the interesting subjects propounded.

January 28-February 1. The Benson Lectures. Dr. Basil Miller, well known author and lecturer, will be the special speaker on the theme, "Christian Journalism."

February 4-8. A series of addresses about John Wesley as, "The Knight of the Burning Heart."

February 11 - 15. Fine Arts Week.

February 18 - 21. President's Week. Dr. A. B. Mackey will address the student body.

February 22. Washington's Day Program.

February 25-29. Student's Week. Students of the graduating class of 1952 will be the chapel speakers.

March 3-7. Local Pastor's Week. Students will have the privilege to hear some of the Nashville pastors.

The programs for the final week of the quarter have not yet been planned, but everyone may be confident that they will be a profitable climax if they compare in interest with those already announced.

City, Missouri. Dr. Mackey and Dr. Bracken attended as two of the twenty-four representatives to the general meetings.

Two days earlier Dr. Bracken attended the meetings of the Foreign Missions Department, of which he is chairman. Dr. Mackey is a member of the Departments of Education and Church Schools.

The Foreign Missions group appropriated money for over one hundred buildings and appointed forty-three missionaries to active work on the field. Among these was a former Trevecca student, Adrian Rosa, and his wife, a former resident of Old Hickory, who were appointed to the Philippines. Two other former Trevecca students were present but received no appointment at this time. However, one, now a minister, is being considered for work among the Indians a little later in the year.

The General Board carries on the work of the church between quadrennial meetings of the General Assembly. Regular operations of Sunday schools, home missions, foreign missions, publications, and education were taken care of at the meeting. Of interest to many may be the fact that plans for ministers' pensions and retirement are being formulated.
