MATCH AND COLOR THE FLAG




Read the explanations of each flag and draw a line to the flag it represents. Then color the flag using the samples at the top of the page.

St. Lucia Flag – The gold in the flag represents the sunshine in the Caribbean. The black and white represent the European and African heritages, living and working in unity.

The isosceles triangle reminds us of the famous twin Piton Mountains, rising out of the sea. They are a symbol of the peoples hopes and dreams.

St. Vincent and Grenadines Flag – The green diamonds are shaped in a V for Saint Vincent. The Blue represents the sky and sea. The gold is for warmth, the bright spirit of the people and the golden sands of the Grenadines. The Green represents the lush vegetation of Saint Vincent's agriculture. The Flag may also be called “The gems”.


Grenada Flag – A red rectangle with seven gold stars, representing the original subdivisions of Grenada. In the center a smaller rectangle, divided into four triangles with a red circle and gold star. Gold represents wisdom and the sun. Green represents vegetation. A nutmeg pod on the left, is an important crop of the island.






Pray for the government and community leaders




Pray for the emergency responders




Pray for the children in this community




Pray for the Immigrant communities where you live
