PREFACE

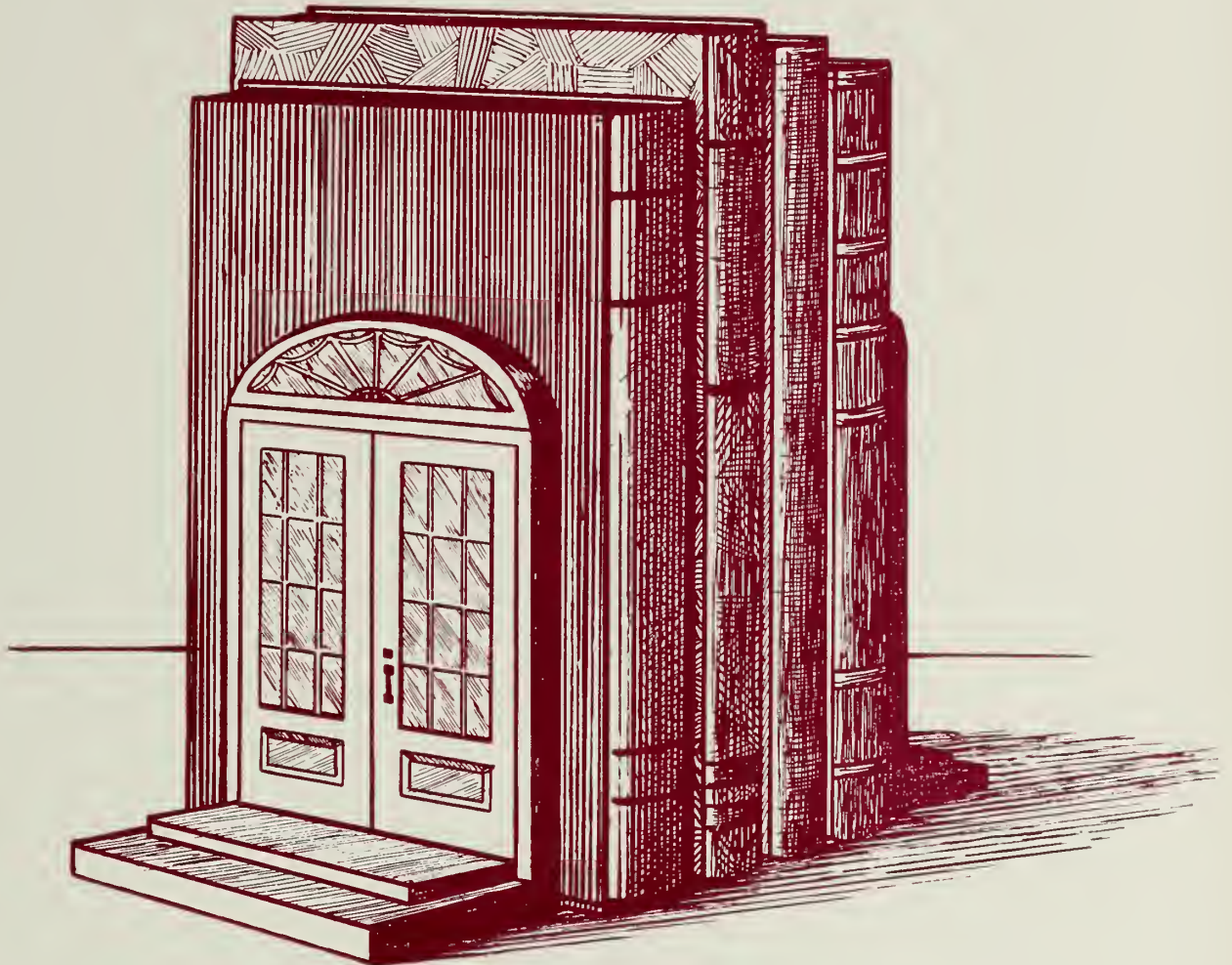

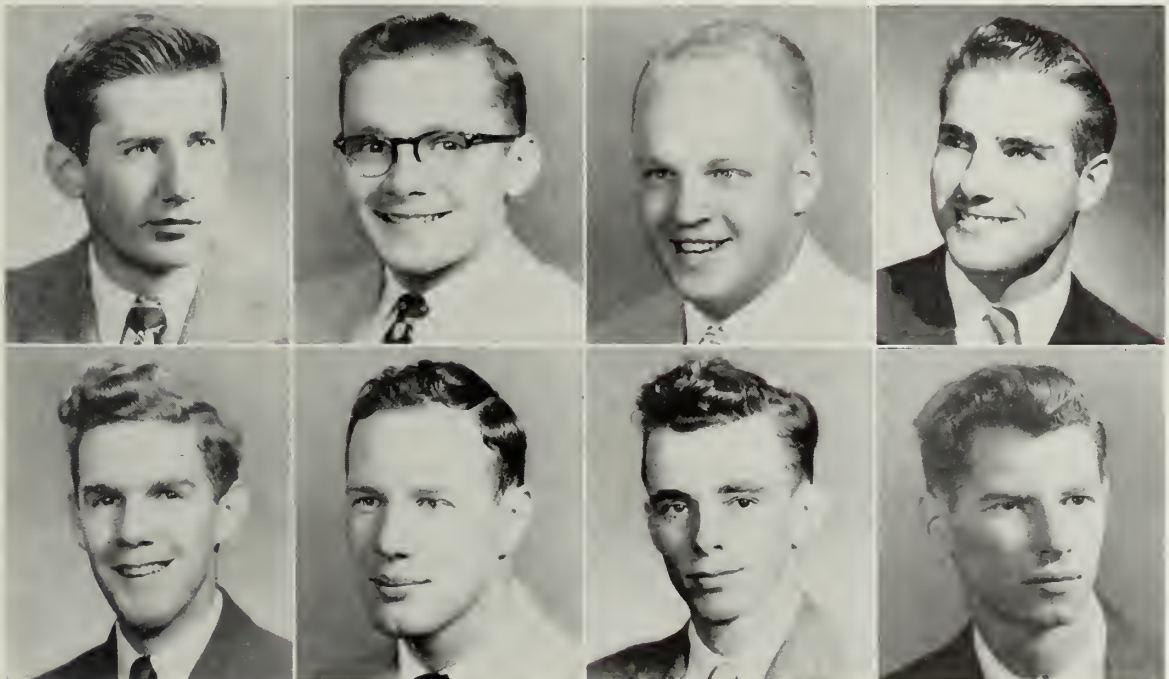

We soon made the first hurdles as we took our first Western Civ. exam and passed in our first Rhetoric theme.

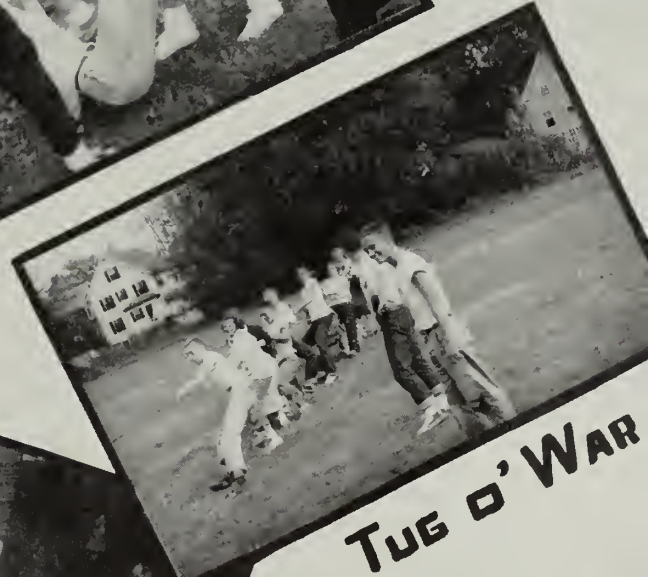

The lone defeat handed the Sigmas came from the Zetas in their final game. The Kappas aided the Sigma's cause by defeating the Green and Gold in their final tilt.

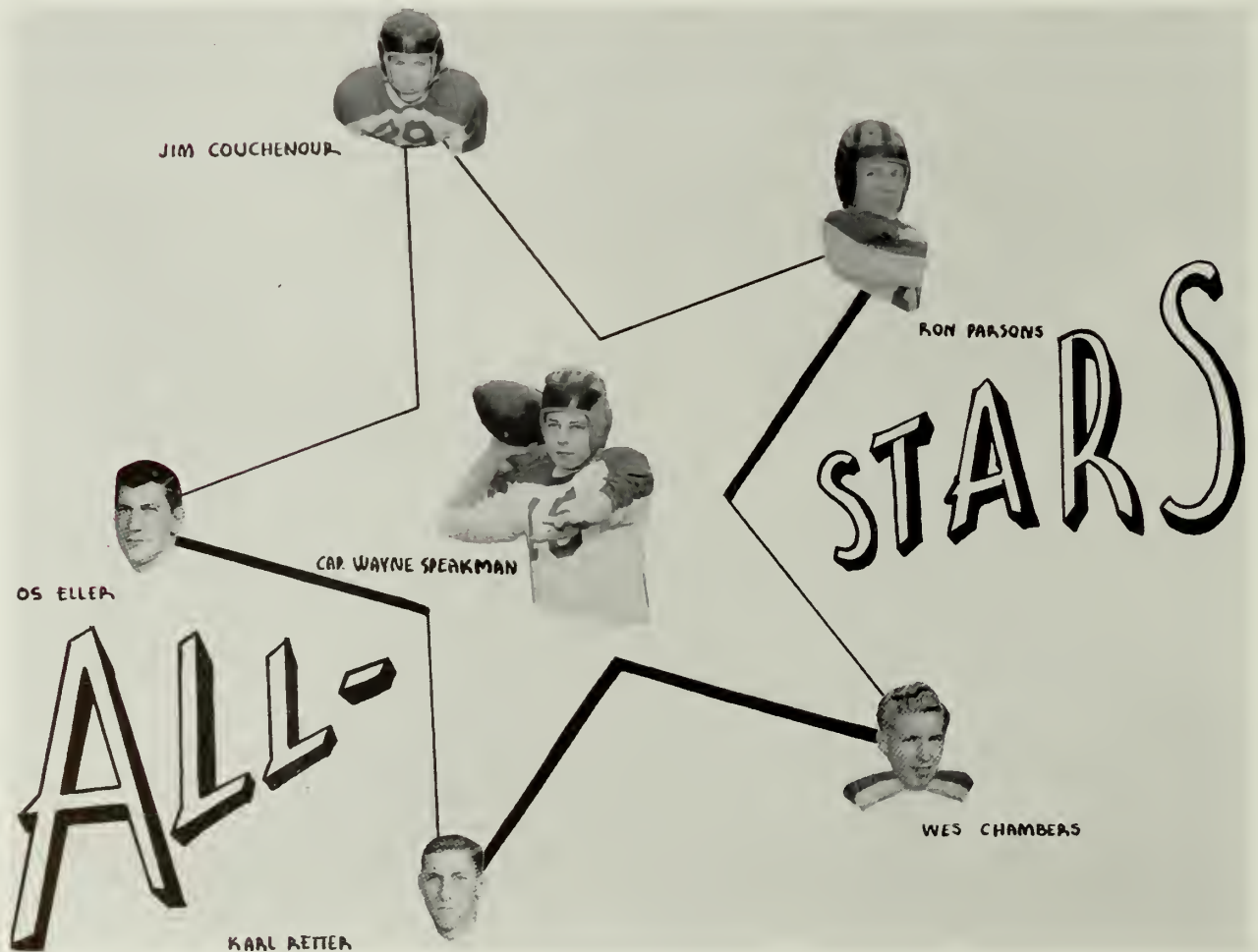
The Deltas, riddled by the loss of players, failed to win a game in spite of their fighting spirit.

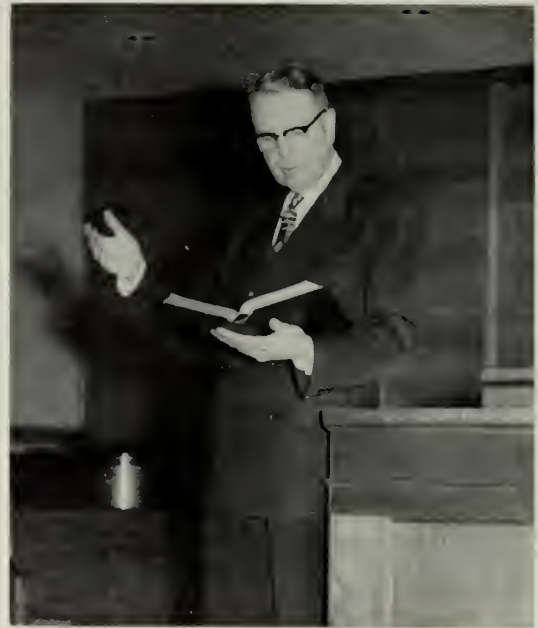


My Dear Friends:
