SECOND SEMESTER OPENING

The second semester opened Monday, February 2nd with a very satisfactory enrollment. Some of the first semester students were unable to enroll but sufficient new students registered to bring the enrollment very near that of the first semester.

One of the very encouraging features of the enrollment this year is the unusual growth in the College of Liberal Arts. The enrollment for 1929-30 was 134. The enrollment for 1930-31 at this date is 164, distributed in classes as follows:

> Seniors - - - - 17 Juniors - - - - 35 Sophomores - 35 Freshmen - - 77

Total - - 164 Increase of 22 per cent

With our enlarged and remodeled Administration building ready for the opening in the fall, we should enroll not less than 200 in the College of Liberal Arts.

As the Students saw the **REVIVAL**

One of N.N.C.'s greatest days was December

4th, 1930. We need not be urged to praise the Lord. Our hearts are full of the "Joy of the Lord". Truly the Spirit of God is among us. The Hely Ghost is going through our midst as a refining fire.

At 10:30 on December 4th the students and fa-culty gathered for chapel. Dean Wallace spoke to us from the words ''Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from meye that work iniquity" (Matt. 7:22 and 23.) She also used five of Wesley's fruits of the Spirit: Gentleness, Goodness, Fidel-ity, Meekness, and Temperance. As we knelt for prayer, the Spirit of God came upon us Students and faculty wind for God.

upon us. Students and faculty cried for God to help them live as they should. The sanctified confessed their failings and shortcomings, the unsanctified cried for the blessing, and the backsliders sought God.

Altar service after altar service occurred, confession after confession. Time passed unnoticed; dinner was long since past. Such a humbling time I have never seen. The room was literally filled with groans of those who saw their condi-tion, - how they had failed to live up to their privileges in Christ, how the devil had deceived them in making them believe they were "all right".

right". But at 3:30 the glory hit us like a gale from the celestial world. Indeed the words, "Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and He shall lift you up", (James 4-10), were made manifest. An hour was spent in praising the Lord. Some shouted, some laughed, some cried, some marched around the room. Over a hundred and fifty had a fortaste of heaven a fortaste of heaven.

When the meeting was dismissed at 4:30, the interest was as great as it had been at noon. We were loath to leave the place that God had made holy by His presence.

Nor has the revival stopped. The next day was similar, chapel lasting until after 3 o'clock. The services at the church have a similar tone. Dried up Christians who have not had a spell for years are getting blessed again. Students are answering their call to the ministry. Some have had visions, prayer is heard, the ungodly are afraid. People are seeking the Lord in their rooms, at

People are seeking the Lord in their rooms, at church, at school -- everywhere. Lift up your faith Oh! Nazarenes. Go down before the Lord. He wants to get to us as a church with a reannointing for a real revival over our whole zone. Let's not fail to do our part. "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams. Your yourg men shall see shall dream dreams, your young men shall see visions. And also upon the servants and upon the handmaidens in those days will I pour out my Spirit''. (Joel 2:28-29)

December 4th, 1930 was a day which will long be remembered at N.N.C. After a few days of pouring out our hearts in prayer, the Holy Spirit came upon the Christians of the student body in a deep, heart-searching way as the dean of wo-men, Mrs. Rhoda Wallace, led the service, using as a foundation for her message Matthew 7:21-23 and followed by the reading of John Wesley's, *Fruits of Perfect Love*. How the Holy Spirit re-vealed to us our hearts, the failings, the indifference to the iniquity hidden there that caused us to be so powerless and unconcerned caused us to be so powerless and unconcerned about others!

Some rushed to the altar and found pardon or cleansing. Conviction continued to fall on those present as one after another confessed his shortpresent as one after another confessed his short-comings. It became necessary to have a second altar service. Such going down and humbling ourselves before the Lord! Workers were called into His service, problems were settled, many found such freedom from bondage to people as they had never known.

The chapel was well filled, and although the meeting lasted for six hours without an inter-mission even for dinner, the students were so reluctant to leave that it was necessary to dismiss. three times before the meeting broke up. The burden is upon us mightily that we humble our-selves before the Lord till He shall endue us with power from on high and send us forth rever to cool off, never to settle down, and be "saved and sanctified" Christians without power and without a vision of a world that is lost.

After an opening prayer Brother Martin opened the meeting for testimonies, and from then on the Holy Spirit had conplete control. The pastor was not given time to preach. Testimonies were given by several students who had been thorough-ly blessed during the day and by the parents and church folk who had been praying for the revival to come. President DeLong gave his testimony with feeling and announced his intention to have perfect liberty in the church as well as in the school. Brother Jacob Cope testified then and was so moved by the Spirit he could not stay in his seat. As he marched down the aisle he ex-horted, and as shouts of "Hallelujah" and "Glory" rang through the church the President started marching around the church. Others followed, both students and older people, marching and shouting, while tears flowed freely and the Holy shouting, while tears flowed freely and the Holy Spirit hovered in power. It was a wonderfulsight. Some who had not had any freedom or liberty in their lives before, some who had before been hindered by their dignity now forgot it all in the joy of liberty. People who before had stood aloof from the college students, thinking that perhaps they were not equal in education, found that in vital salvation they had a common meeting ground and mixed with each other as they had not before. The time slipped quickly by, and when the meeting came to a close all were loath to go, for we had truly been on a mount of meeting with God.

meeting with God. December 4th will always be a red letter day in my Christian life and in the lives of many others also, for we cannot fully estimate the benefit that will come from that wonderful night. And it isn't over yet. The revival fires are burn-ing higher and we are looking for greater bless-ings yet. 'Hallelujah'! 'Glory'!


