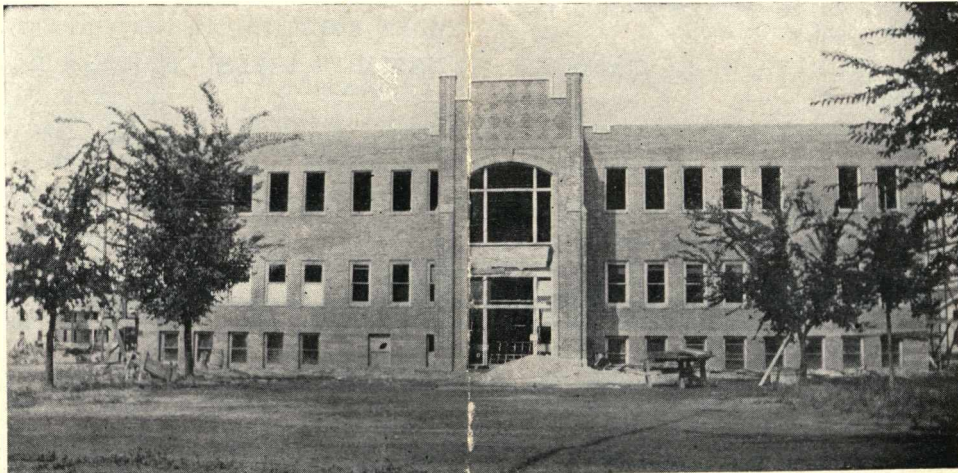

Plan now to be present with hundreds of others at the great Opening Convention and Dedication of the new buildings.

Benefit Banquet

In addition to the cost of the new buildings it is necessary to properly furnish the rooms, offices, etc. To furnish the Administration Building adequately it will take 483 new opera chairs for the new auditorium, 200 arm chairs for classrooms, one hundred library chairs, 72 window shades, 600 square feet of blackboard, 6 teachers' desks, and several pieces of office furniture. In addition to that mentioned at least three chemistry tables will be needed. The total cost will be not less than \$4000.00.

In trying to solve this problem it was suggested that we have a banquet during the opening week for the benefit of the needed furniture.

The Board of Directors asked President DeLong to appoint a committee to make arrangements. The Nampa Chamber of Commerce very enthusiastically endorsed the program and appointed a committee to serve on the larger committee appointed by the President. The personnel of the committee is as follows:

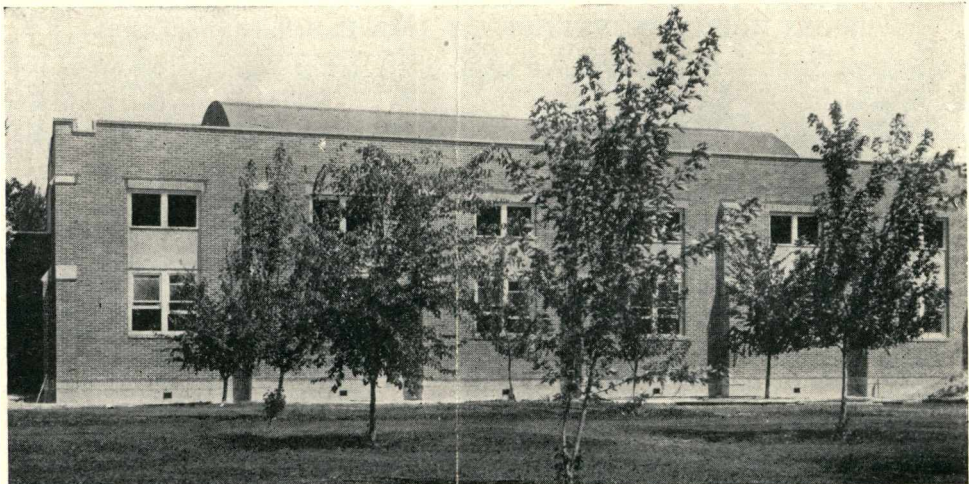
