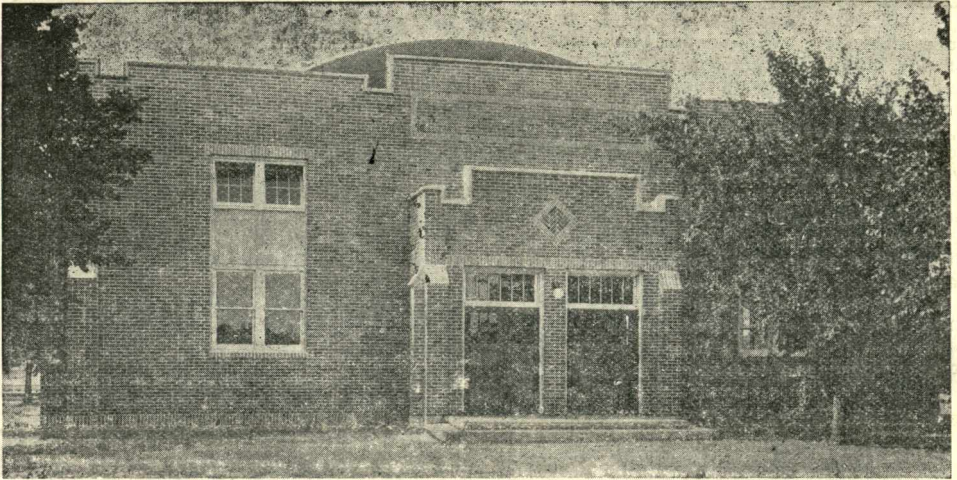

Bible College Department

The subjects offered cover the Course of Study of the Church of the Nazarene. Two years work will obtain a Bible College certificate. The work is intended primarily for preachers and Christian workers, but young people who are following lines of secular work are urged to spend at least a year at Northwest Nazarene College. Not only is there the personal value of the wider horizons and friendships of life in a spiritual school, but there is specific training to increase their effectiveness as leaders of Young Peoples' societies Sunday School teachers, etc.

The courses offered this year in the Bible College will include Bible, Theology, Church Music, Church History, Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, English, and kindred subjects of great value to every Christian worker, such as Church School Methods, Daily Vacation Bible School, Child Psychology, etc.
