To Be Deferred

From the Daily Nebraskan, University of Nebraska:

Since most of the males returning to this campus have not yet served in the armed forces because of the college deferment system, they are looked upon as shirkers by the mud-caked GI's fighting on the Korean hills. Veterans say they do not blame any man individually for doing everything in his power to keep out of the service, but they do blame a system which enabels a certain section of young America to escape a draft call.

Their arguments are understandable, but understandable arguments can be offered in defense of the college deferment system. also . . . in a great many ways it is vitally important that the college student has a chance to finish school before his induction. It makes him much more valuable to his branch of the serivce . . . The world is becoming progressively more complicated, and it takes trained minds to handle the new problems.

Another point . . . is the fact that every man does not automatically receive a deferment just by registering at a university. To be deferred, a man must have either a scholastic average high enough to impress his draft board or receive a passing grade on the Deferment Examination.

In all, no university student should stay awake nights because he is lying in a dorm bed and not a foxhole. A rrangements have been made to ease your guilty conscience after graduation.

PRESENTING TREVECCA'S COUNSELING PROGRAM

dean of students.

We want it to be clear that the counseling services are open to every member of the student body. The faculty and staff of Trevecca Nazarene College are happy to cooperate in the counseling program; our desire is that through the counseling services and the general atmosphere of Christian friendship, Trevecca College will be a place where young people will know the thrill of being growing persons. Each college freshman is by now acquainted with his personal

counselor who is in charge of his group orientation meetings and some have had the first interview with his counselor. These Freshman Counselors will have counseling hours each week, at which time the Counseling Room in Hardy Hall will be reserved for their personal interviews. The students should see his counselor and arrange the time for the desired interview. One-half hour will be the usual length of the first interviews, now being scheduled by the counselors. Other interviews can be arranged according to the need and desires of the student.

Students other than college freshmen may desire personal interviews with the six faculty members now serving as Freshmen counselors. It is understandable that reasons of personal preference may figure in your choice of a counselor.

To all students, especially to upperclassmen who have no personal counselor designated as yet, it is suggested that, in case the list below does not make it clear whom you should choose as counselor for a special problem, you could have a brief generalized interview with the dean of students who would in turn refer you to the counselor thought best.

The following faculty members are listed with their special areas of counseling so that all students may be familiar with the services available to them, and so they may be guided in their selection of a counselor with whom to discuss a particular problem. Faculty members will also find it useful when referring the student to a counselor who should be prepared to counsel with the student concerning a special problem.

Despite the very disheartening entrance exams given prior to registration, the freshmen emerged with a greater number of students enrolled than any other class or division. 100 students are now classified as freshmen, 62 as sophomores, 45 as juniors, and 25 as seniors.

In the four high school grades 89 students are registered; 22 in the demonstration school; while the Junior Theological division boasts

38 future ministers. Special or unclassified students number 11. A complete count of the college men and women as tabulated by the registrar is as follows:
